

## Roundups, Resentments & Rumors

Proof we're not yet "perfect" .. "S/M" and "PMS" were among the diverse topics offered at a recent major Roundup. This raised valid points as such areas are clearly outside A.A.'s stated purpose. History, fortunately, shows "generic recovery programs" lose their viability with alcoholics when their focus broadens into other areas. The main concern would be the reaction of a newcomer, exposed to such a melee of alphabet soup solutions, who mistakenly thinks "it's ALL part of A.A."

We're reminded of a quote from Bill W., "Shoemaker, stick to thy last; better to do one thing supremely well than many badly" (*Twelve and Twelve, Tradition Five, Par. 1*).

## Another Roundup Solution (or 2)

To avoid confusion about Roundups, get a copy of AAWS pamphlet A.A. Guidelines (MG4). The number of Roundups continues to grow at a dramatic rate, often put on by A.A.ers with the best of intentions, but lacking some basic roots in our Traditions. This simple pamphlet will clear up any misconceptions.

Given recent problems at two other Roundups, we'll pass on another idea: Roundup (and Group) Treasurers should have a few years sobriety, be well known within the sponsoring Group, and ideally have some business experience. All checks should require TWO signatures.

The IAC Board voted at the 1991 Fall meeting to set aside 10% of all contributions for the 1995 Convention. As of June 30, 1992, our savings account has \$692.59 which is a long way from what we anticipate we will need. Needless to say, we need you and your group to assist in making 1995's

events happen. As you consider your contributions to the various service organizations. keep our 1995 obligation in mind. Another way of giving is through birthday donations. Len Z. of Rockville, Connecticut sent in a birthday donation for having 14 years sobriety. John H of Sarasota, Florida marked 12 years with a donation. ## What it was like, What happened & What it's like now

#### "Martinis at Age Two"

Allyson D. of Atlanta sent a rigorously honest, detailed version of "her story." Space here prohibits us from telling it all, starting at age two sipping martinis and beer. Incest, rape, prostitution, failed marriages and psychiatric wards followed — always accompanied by alcohol. We pick up Allyson's story 25 years after that toddler sipped her first martini. [Ed.]

When I came into the program of Alcoholics Anonymous, I was 27. It was January 16, 1983 and I weighed 95 pounds. I was bleeding internally and suffering from malnutrition. I'd lost the great love of my life and was once again homeless. I hadn't really worked in 2 years. My van wasn't running and none of my friends wanted anything to do with me. I figured out my life was unmanageable. Having tried everything else, A.A. was the last house on the street. I came, I hated it, men hugged me, and I couldn't stop crying. I had not cried in a very long time. I screamed and kicked my way through my first year and I broke the rules. I slept with the only woman who would feed and house me. I rewrote the literature to fit my feminist perspective until some jerk told me that I might run off some one who would die if it was written like that. I vehemently disagreed but for the first time I cared more that someone else lived than that I was right. I began to learn to learn and I tried behaviors that I didn't like or believe in. They worked. I had finally found a group that wouldn't throw me out. And miraculously, I didn't throw up any more.

Throughout the time I have been in A.A., I've made some pretty rough mistakes. Years of violence, abuse, and self-loathing take time to heal. While I went to meetings and worked the steps, my disease took the scenic route through food, sex, power, spending, talking. I have experienced powerlessness with it all. At a year and a half sober I was homeless again, with no marketable skills and no internal resources. It was at this point that the internal hole that I had tried to fill with everything and everybody began to take shape. God-shaped. I moved from compliance with the program to reliance. However, on my three year A.A. birthday I was jailed for a felony. I had forged my license plate sticker because I still believed some of the rules were wrong and therefore I didn't have to follow them. Sober behind bars has a wonderful educational quality to it.

Ancient minds sought to discover how and why we develop into people with conscience. They questioned how we can arrive at truth and right living. Their answers are reflected, I believe, in the 12 steps of A.A. I began primitively with pain as my teacher. I slowly began to take Good Orderly Direction because I had to or I would die. Then, I listened to the Group Of Drunks in A.A. because I would hurt if I didn't. I wanted what they had. My insides changed as I did what they told me they had done. One day I realized that I was doing things because when I didn't I felt uncomfortable. And finally, I follow spiritual law and human laws because it feels good and I believe in them.

Today, I have an education and am working on more. I live in the house God gave me seven and a half years ago. I am blessed with a full time work that is fulfilling. Like the book says, I have become usefully whole. I have a four and a half year relationship with a wonderful woman whom I respect and who is my friend. We share this fellowship and our lives in a way that I believed was only possible for other people. The grass I grew, this Spring, is in my garden, the friends I have cultivated in A.A.

I have been blessed with a Higher Power in my life that I believe and trust in, not because someone told me to, but, because this power has proven over and over Its love and caring for me in every area of my life. I feel safe, at last.

Some of the external changes continue to amaze me. I find pleasure in putting on lipstick and dresses in the morning. (Although you may want to know that I'm butch where it counts) I pay my bills and vote. I own a car, credit cards, a VCR. These were not my goals. They are byproducts of taking the steps that work.

A part of the world, a part of society, the revolution I longed for in all of you has incredibly taken place within me.

The Program, the Twelve Steps, and the fellowship of A.A. has given me the opportunity to be who I dreamed I was and who my God believed I was all along.

For this, I thank you.
